The Red Cross brings together donors and volunteers who embrace their shared humanity to assist the most vulnerable. In Quebec, this solidarity materializes three times a day on the scene of emergencies.

#### Always ready to respond

Before an emergency occurs, the Red Cross must be prepared to lend a helping hand, regardless of the scale of the disaster and the number of people affected.

#### 17 warehouses

for emergency supplies (cots, blankets, pillows, personal care items)



**870+ disaster** services agreements with Quebec municipalities



## 2 mobile rapid response units

ready to be deployed across Quebec, and 1 emergency response vehicle used as a command post and a safe environment to help people affected by a disaster



#### From the very first moments

In the midst of an emergency, when the people affected by a fire or flood need it most, the Red Cross is there. Trained volunteers are mobilized to the scene, at any time of the day or night, to provide emergency services:



a safe place to sleep



essential baby products



comfort, blankets and stuffed animals



personal care items



new weatherappropriate clothing



#### To recovery


Following major disasters such as a tornado or spring floods, the Red Cross, alongside local organizations, continues to be there for the people whose lives have been impacted by the disaster in order to help them recover.

#### Our capacity to adapt

At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Canadian Red Cross was there to respond to emerging needs and support communities, thanks to our strong capacity to adapt and respond quickly when disasters strike.

Various responses were carried out by our teams during the first year of the pandemic, including:\*

#### + 1,000 people

from all walks of life answered the call to join our extraordinary humanitarian taskforce

89 care settings received assistance from our Support Aides



#### 217 living environments were visited

by epidemic control and prevention specialists



#### 2 field hospital components were deployed

to support the LaSalle Hospital and the Chisasibi community in Northern Quebec



#### 11 food distribution sites

were set up in Montréal to help people in vulnerable situations during the summer and winter of 2020

#### 6 sites

were set up to respond to the basic needs of people experiencing homelessness



#### A daily presence at border crossings

helped with sample collection, for a monthly average of **1,769 people** returning to Canada



#### 7,392 friendly calls

were made in support of people in isolation



#### Vaccination support

was offered by humanitarian workers in all 14 communities in Nunavik and teams in Montréal and Laval
